Journal focus

IKENGA Journal of African Studies is dedicated to the critical study of the fortunes of the black man down the centuries, and of his contemporary problems and dilemmas. Its interest covers the entire spectrum of African Studies. *IKENGA*, after which the journal has been named, is a cult object of the Igbo-speaking peoples to which traditionally is attributed success or good fortune in the professions or in life generally. It is also closely associated with the right arm with which a man hacks his way through life. *IKENGA* could, therefore, be briefly described as the Igbo god of achievement. The journal is not committed to preaching any particular gospel but accommodates all views relevant to the fortune of the black man on the basis of objective study and analysis of issues, whether historical or contemporary. Opinions expressed in the articles which *IKENGA* carries are entirely those of the authors.

Manuscript preparation and submission process

1. Manuscripts (including technical reports, book reviews and references) must be 1.5 line spaced, 12-point font and Times New Roman or Arial. All manuscripts must be in Microsoft Word (PDF files are not accepted).
2. Authors must submit a title page, including the abstract (not more than 200 words), institutional affiliation(s), email address and a short biography (not more than 400 words).
3. Authors should submit a separate file of all the charts, tables and figures. They should be numbered serially and indicated in the text where they appeared. Where photographs are used, we encourage the authors to reduce the colour images to avoid extra cost being added to the author(s).
4. The journal insists on the use of *APA referencing style*. The APA referencing style is an "author-date style", which denotes that the author's last name and the year of publication for the source should appear in the text, for instance, (Woods, 2019), while the complete reference (alphabetically by name of first author) for each source must also appear in the reference list at the end of the paper.
5. The journal accepts manuscripts submitted electronically through online process or e-mail. Visit the journal site: <http://ikengajournal.com.ng/home>. If you have not submitted a paper to the journal online process before, then, you will need to

Publication ethics

Publisher and editors of *IKENGA* shall take reasonable steps to identify and prevent the publication of papers where research misconduct (**plagiarism, double submission/publication, fraudulent publication, conflict of interest, use of exclusive language – sexist, racist, homophobic, among others**) has occurred. The journal does not encourage any publication misconduct, or knowingly permit or ignore such misconduct to take place. However, where any misconduct has occurred, which is not a deliberate action of the editors and/or author(s), retraction or correction, clarifications and apologies will be published in the next edition following the detection of the error(s). Before any research article is published, authors must do the followings:

- *Declare that the manuscript has not been submitted or published elsewhere.*
- *Declare any conflict of interest.*
- *Ensure that all co-authors merit criteria for authorship and ensure appropriate acknowledgements made in the manuscript.*
- *Include appropriate funding statements in the manuscript.*
- *Submission of ethical clearance (ensuring research using animals is conducted responsibly).*
- *Inform the journal Editor of any content or timeline changes made in the research before publication by the journal;*
- *Advise and report to the Editor of the IKENGA journal through the email (ikengajournal@unn.edu.ng) immediately any complaints or changes in the content or conduct of the research take place in the course of the approval period that may warrant a review of the ethical clearance.*

All research articles MUST also comply with section 5.4, sub-sections 1–5 of the extant ethical policy paper of the University of Nigeria Nsukka (Read our Research Publishing Ethics Guidelines: <http://ikengajournal.com.ng/pethics.php>)
